Himachal Pradesh Forest Ecosystem Management and Livelihood Improvement Project

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Introduction

Located in the western Himalayas of Himachal Pradesh, this state is known for its natural beauty and rich cultural heritage. The state is filled with diverse ecosystems, rivers, and valleys. Its population is approximately 70 lakhs, and it covers a geographical area of 55,673 square kilometers. The high altitude and cold zone areas span from the Shivalik hills to the middle Himalayas. The main occupation of the people of the state is agriculture.

The **Himachal Pradesh Forest Ecosystem Management and Livelihood Improvement Project** is being implemented in 6 out of 12 districts of Himachal Pradesh, in collaboration with JICA. This includes the Kullu district as well.

With the launch of the **Himachal Pradesh Forest Ecosystem Management and Livelihood Improvement Project** by JICA, the **Gram Forest Development Committee** and the **Mother Mandasan Command** have created a plan. According to the plan, the main occupation of the people in the **Van Vikas Samiti** (Forest Development Committee) is agriculture and gardening, but the average land area per family is quite small. People primarily grow wheat, maize, barley, and pulses, along with vegetables and horticultural crops such as apples, plums, and apricots. However, due to limited resources, the expected increase in their income is not happening.

To address this, the **Self-Help Group Kashu Narayan** decided to enhance its livelihood by engaging in sewing, cutting, and related activities. The group was formed on **March 23, 2021**, and later on **August 13, 2021**, it was changed to a **Common Interest Group**.

The group consists of **15 women members**. After detailed discussions, the group decided to focus on tailoring and marketing. Initially, with the help of the project, they will be trained in stitching **ladies suits (without lining and with lining)**, **gents night suits**, and **kids' dresses**.

The project will bear 50% of the capital expenditure for the general category and 75% for poor women in the general category. Additionally, a **Revolving Fund of ₹1,00,000** will be provided, making it easier for the group to take loans from the bank.

The group has agreed that all members will work together according to the terms and conditions, and will equally distribute the dividends based on the work done.

This business plan has been created after several meetings with the group members.

According to the business plan, the group is expected to produce the following each month:

- 300 ladies suits (without lining)
- 180 ladies suits (with lining)
- 180 gents night suits
- 120 kids dresses

The group is expected to work 4 to 5 hours a day to produce these items.

3-Geographical Detail of village

(K) Why do you need a business plan?

The Village Forest Development Committee (VFDC) Mata Mandasanain did not have an existing women's group, so the project facilitated the formation of a Self-Help Group (SHG). All the women in this group aim to enhance their livelihoods through sewing and cutting work.

Some women in the group already have experience in sewing and cutting but lack proper training and currently only undertake small stitching tasks for their households. Additionally, some women neither own a sewing machine nor have any training. Due to these challenges, they have been unable to expand their livelihood opportunities.

To address these issues, the women have organized themselves into a group under the JICA project and have requested sewing and cutting machines along with proper training to improve their skills and income prospects.

(b) Business Objectives of the scheme:

- Building the capacity of all group members
- Providing a steady stream of income for the group
- Connecting the product to the right market
- Motivating all members to work in a group
- To promote latest and modern techniques of sewing and cutting industry
- increase in livelihood

(G) Business plan includes the following tasks

• Tailoring – Cutting (including ladies suits, children dresses, men night suits etc.

(d) Statement of functions of the business plan,

(1) <u>Community Mobilization :</u> Under this, after creating awareness and community mobilization among the villagers, the livelihood enhancement options have been selected and the beneficiaries have been shortlisted for the same.

(2)Formation of the group: A group has been formed by gathering the members of the self-help group and the president, secretary and treasurer of the group have been elected unanimously.AWith the consent of the group members, provision has been made to determine the rules and conditions for the group and implement them.

(3) Capacity Building: Proper training is essential for capacity building.

(4) **Distribution of sewing machines etc.:** Good quality machines should be made available to all the members of the group so that they can work properly

(5) Market Linkage: The group is ready to enter into a relationship with any government or private society to sell its products on reasonable terms and conditions. A Like dresses for children of local schools, business will be linked with the tailors of local market Will work in collaboration with the tailors of Bhuntar market area.

(6) Linkages with financial institutions and related departments : To expand the business, efforts will be made to link the group with financial institutions and provide them with loans from various banks.}kjkYou will be made aware of the loan facilities being provided and the project}kjkwill be linked to banksA

Production Process Details

Self Help Groups

This involves the stitching of Ladies Suits Lining, Without Lining, Kids Dresses, and Gents Night Suits.

1. Ladies Suit Lining:

- 6 group members will do the stitching of ladies suit linings.
- If each member works 4 to 5 hours per day, they will prepare 1 suit in a day.

2. Ladies Suit Without Lining:

- o 5 group members will do the stitching work of ladies suits without lining.
- Each member will earn Rs. 1000 per day by working 4 to 5 hours per day.
- They will prepare 2 suits in one day.

3. Gents Night Suit:

- 2 members of the group will do the stitching work for gents night suits.
- In 1 day, a member will earn Rs. 1000 by working 4 to 5 hours.
- They will prepare 3 suits in one day.

4. Children's Dresses:

- 2 members of the group will do the stitching work for children's dresses.
- Each member will earn Rs. 1000 per day by working 4 to 5 hours.
- They will prepare 2 dresses in one day.

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Management of Work Among Group Members

The members of the group will divide the work by mutual consent, and the income will be distributed according to the work done. All members of the Self Help Group will be responsible for work. The work distribution and each member's role will be based on their economic, physical, and mental capabilities. These members will also maintain the financial records.

9 SWOT Analysis Strengths

1. All group members have a similar and positive outlook.

2. One group member will work on small-scale tailoring.

Weaknesses

1. It is a new Self Help Group.

2. The group does not have experience in working together.

Opportunities

1. Working in the group can lead to large-scale production.

2. There is high demand for suit stitching and other services in local markets due to the tourism sector.

3. The project will provide 75% support for Scheduled Caste/Tribe and poor general category women,

and 50% for general category women for purchasing tailoring machines and other equipment.

4. The project will provide expert training for tailoring either on-site or through institutions.

Threats

- 1. Internal conflicts within the group can affect the group's work.
- 2. Lack of demand and transparency can lead to the breakdown of the group.

After stitching these items, the group will have a total amount of $\gtrless160,700$ for distribution. Out of this amount: $\gtrless77,100$ will be distributed as wages & $\gtrless83,600$ will be received as dividends. Each member will earn an additional income of $\gtrless10,713$ per month by working an average of 4 hours per day. Additionally, the project will carry an interest rate of 5% throughout the year. As a result, the group will save $\gtrless620$ more."
