In addition to these on-going models, Jadi-Buti Cell has prepared one more Model for Commercial Propagation of *Terminaliabellirica* (Baheda). This was put for approval by GB.

Planting and Transfer of Technology to Stakeholders. The Governing Body was informed that a Project Proposal on "Production of Good Planting Stock Harar(Terminaliachebula), Bahcda (Terminaliabellirica), Amla (Emblicaofficinalis) and Reetha (Sapindusmukorassi) submitted by Dr. YS Parmar University of Horticulture and Forestry, Nauni, Solan H.P. for carrying out Planting and Transfer of Technology to Stakeholders under the JICA Forestry Project. The estimated cost of the proposal was Rs.47.08 Lakhs for 3 years w.c.f. 2024-25 to 2026-27. Under the Project Proposal 56,900 grafted plants were proposed be supplied to JICA Forestry Project from three places by the UHF Nauni, Solan. The cost and carriage of planting material will be borne by the Project as already mentioned in the propagation models. Initially, the plantation will be undertaken under Mandi, Suket, Nurpur and Bilaspur Forest Divisions and replicated to other appropriate Project areas.

Proposal for Intervention in Sacred Groves as a part of "Satoyama".

The Governing Body was appraised that the existence of sacred groves in India dates back to an ancient preagrarian hunter gathering era and their presence has been documented since the early 1800s.

Sacred groves are therefore, important today very reservoirs of biodiversity conservation areas in the entire Himalayan Region and in addition they have important cultural and religious values for the Local communities since time immemorial. Large number of sacred groves is identified in the State by Himachal Pradesh Council for Science Technology Environment, Shimla. Some of the sacred groves have prospect lο becoming biological diversity heritage sites and their protection and management has

Member secretary apprised that in JICA Forestry Project, we are working on various components including Livelihood activities and the trained manpower which is very much required from time on time. In addition to meet this requirement, Co-Chairman of Governing Body also suggested that internship program has also been designed in Wild Life wing of HPFD and project can also get some idea for initiation such program.

In this context, worthy Chairman suggested that there should be a in-depth working on this internship program according to academic qualifications and modalities to get the budget allotment for this program.

The agenda was approved in-principle.

Chairman was directed to study the internship schemes/ programs prepared by other government departments / wildlife wing of HPFD and seek approval from competent authority. However, the GB was of the view that the internship bcinga learning experience for the interns, should be without any stipend.

Governing Body was apprised that JICA Forestry Project is strategically investing in training the current staff on marketing and efforts are being made to make them HPSRLM Compliant groups.

Therefore, it was proposed to withdrawn the agenda item.

CPD informed that bamboo artisan communities have been identified and a launch workshop was held on 24.02.2024, in the presence of Hon'ble TCP Minister,Sh. Rajesh Dharmani and Rs. 2.56 Lakh has been disbursed and utilized by DMU Bilaspur. Further, a detailed action plan is being prepared by FCCU/DMU Bilaspur and the activities will be started after the model code of conduct is over. Governing Body was apprised that a Study was conducted through the PMU Staff and field staff of Bilaspur Forest Division to find out the availability of all types of bamboo in Bilaspur Division on private land. The study was done by following random sampling system and the data collected was analyzed at both beat and village level. Further it was apprised that, it was noticed during analysis that there is not much availability of bamboo on private land, thus such activity on large scale cannot be sustained. Since the bamboo artisans are very poor people and can't afford to purchase bamboo regularly round the year, therefore to take bamboo based livelihood activity on large scale does not seem to be a profitable venture. It was proposed that, the existing group of artisans shall be imparted skill based training at village level in the project area along with financial support to purchase small equipment and

tools as per provision in the project. Sufficient funds are available under Livelihood Improvement Support Component for these activities.

This reimbursable portion is being utilized on the activities mentioned in the main project components i.e. (A) Sustainable Forest Ecosystems Management (B) Biodiversity Conservation (C) Livelihood Improvement (D) Institutional Capacity Strengthening and Consulting Services (PMC). The non-reimbursable portion is Rs. 160 Cr. of State share, is being spent on General Administrative Expenses (salaries/TA/Medical of Dept. employees deputed in the Project) and GST/levy etc.

AGENDA ITEM No.-5:

Utilization of funds to meet up the APO provided for 2025-26 under Component -III

Governing Body was apprised that, under Component-III of JICA Forestry Project, 920 Self Help Groups (SHGs) have been formed under 460 VFDS/BMC sub-committees and are being supported through skill-based training, capital cost assistance and marketing support for 26 identified Income Generation Activities (IGAs) opted by them. However, most SHGs have adopted only a single IGA, limiting their year-round income generation potential and diversification into multiple IGAs requires additional support from the Project.

Further Governing Body was apprised that the Mid-Term Review also highlighted the need for strengthening entrepreneurship, trainings, sustainable marketing platforms, branding, packaging, cluster formation, convergence and participation in exhibitions/meals etc. to enable SHGs to expand beyond local markets and gain wider recognition.

As the allocated budget under the relevant sub-component (3.3.5) has already been utilized, itwas therefore, proposed that additional funds amounting to Rs. 6 Crore in FY 2025-26 are required for add on activities and marketing support to the SHGs from the other existing budget line i.e. 1.3, 3.3 & 4.2.

Decision:-

The Governing Body approved the agenda and suggested that sustainable livelihood of SHGs formed under JICA Forestry Project should be supported and monitored closely. Chairman emphasized to identify and necessary support to add on Income Generation Activities for financial stability of SHGs for long term.

AGENDA ITEM No.-6:

Collaboration between HP JICA Forestry Project and HP Milkfed for sustainable livelihoods to VFDSs/SHGs formed under PIHPFEM&L.

Governing Body was apprised that, IIP JICA Forestry Project is committed to uplift the rural economy in the Project area to members associated with Village Forest Development Societies/Biodiversity Management Sub Committees which are the registered Societies under Society Act, 2006. Further, these members form SHGs (Self Help Groups) in their concerned Societies and Project provides skill based trainings and capital cost support to their 26 adopted IGAs (Income Generation Activities) followed by approved business plan. Out of these IGAs, dairy related livelihood is also one of the vibrant and demanded IGA to them.

Further it was apprised that, HP MilkFed is one of the pioneer organization of GoIP which deals in milk and milkrelated products across the State. The collaboration aligns with the vision of the Hon'ble Chief Minister, GoIP to augment milk production across the State. This strategic association aims to implement a sustainable approach to rural economic upliftment.

Therefore, a "Pilot Project" has been initiated in three Forest Divisions—Mandi, Nachan, and Suket where 18 SHGs across 14 VFDSs are already engaged in milk production. During this collaboration, HP JICA Forestry Project will facilitate the capital cost support for tools, bulk chilling coolers, milk can coolers, milk containers, milk chillers, milk collection tankers etc. as per availability of milk quantity under identified SHGs/VFDSs and successful execution of this pilot Project will facilitate phased expansion to other Forest Divisions within the Project area.

The Agenda Item was placed before Governing Body for approval.

AGENDA ITEM No.-7:

Convergence between HP JICA Forestry Project & HPSRLM to manage & operate the Multipurpose outlets, Marketing Collaborations for SHGs formed under PIHPFEM&L.

Governing Body was apprised that, IIP JICA Forestry Project involves SIIGs and CIGs as basic unit for livelihood improvement activities. Further Governing Body was apprised that, IIPSRLM is successfully running IIIM ERA stores in various locations of Himachal Pradesh.

Therefore, it was proposed to operate and manage the multipurpose outlets formed under JICA Forestry Project with convergence of HPSRLM.

The Agenda Item was placed before, the Governing Body for approval.

Decision:-

The Governing Body agreed to the convergence between HP JICA Forestry Project and HPSRLM as per provision in the DPR. Chairman directed that combined efforts to improve the quality and quantity of the products made by SHGs be given top priority.

AGENDA ITEM No.-8:

Facilitation & Handholding Support by Himalayan Forest Research Institute (HFRI) to Common Interest Groups (CIGs) constituted under 'Jadi-Buti Cell'.

Governing Body was apprised that, Jadi-Buti Cell (JBC) is mandated to promote cultivation of medicinal plants through the members of VFDS and BMC sub-committees in the project areas. Over the years JBC has developed 17 propagation models of various medicinal plants and there are about 50 groups engaged in raising of medicinal plants.

Further Governing Body was apprised that, during 2024, the ICFRE-Himalayan Forest Research Institute, Shimla conducted a series of trainings to the CIGs under the JICA Forestry Project. One major observation from the interactions during the trainings was that there is a need for a continued technical support to ensure the success of their activities under the project. The support from JICA has strengthened these CIGs in confidence and zeal to work outside their safe zone (homes), however, the continued support from JICA and other governmental agencies is required. These CIGs, especially women members have started to reflect on other dimensions of their lives beyond their economic constraints. As desired and felt by JICA, Forestry Project, IIFRI was requested to submit a proposal for hand holding the CIGs to have a sustained benefit of the interventions made by the JICA Forestry Project. III Was requested to facilitate and handhold these groups by organizing workshops & rectifying the shortcomings if any in their practice.

The Project proposal has been received from IIFRI amounting to Rs. 22.61 Lakh and was duly scrutinized by the Jadi-Buti Celland placed before Governing Body as Annexure-C for apporval. Sufficient funds are available under the Project Budget line NTFP based Livelihood Improvement (3.2).

AGENDA ITEM No.10:

Proposal for Satoyama based Ecotourism and Biodiversity Conservation activities during the current FY 2025-2026.

Governing Body was apprised that the Himalayan region of the state holds significant ecotourism potential due to its diverse natural resources, rich biodiversity and unique cultural heritage. Ecotourism, which emphasizes sustainable tourism activities necessarily a group activity with inputs from village communities and assist in planning implementation and sustainable operations can contribute to economic development and community empowerment in these areas.

Further Governing Body was apprised that, keeping in view the indicative outline of the project activities under Ecotourism and in order to achieve the JICA Forestry Project objectives, following four sites have been identified in higher hills of the state in Project areas during the FY-2025-26:-

- 1. Kaisdhar (Phase II from Kaisdhar to Shillong, (Under DMU Kullu)
- 2. Bagasahran to Bishleo Pass and DharSarga (Under DMU Ani)
- 3. Churdhar Valley (Under DMU Chopal)
- 4. One more site to be identified for development of ecotourism during the current If Y 2025-2026.

Following activities are proposed in the selected sites:

- i. Repair of Bridle path
- ii. Development of eco-trails
- iii. Interpretation and Information centre/sale outlet/Trekker huts/Rain shelters
- iv. Additional recreational activities
- v. Protection wall/ Light crash Barriers/Railings along the eco-trails
- vi. Eco-friendly sitting places
- vii. Repair of Drains and seasonal nallas
- viii. Establishment of charging stations
- ix. Development of natural water resources
- x. Entry/exist gates
- xi. Development of water bodies for trekkers/tourist and wild Animals
- xii. Singes and sign boards
- xiii. Solar lights
- xiv. Repair of Inspection hut.

The activities of the proposal will help in improving the protection of existing forest from fire and other hazards. The estimated cost on these activities for all the three proposed and one to be decided sites during the FY-2025-26 is Rs 5Cr.

AGENDA ITEM No.11-:

Introduction of Spring shed Management Activity under Satoyama in the JICA Forestry Project.

Governing Body was apprised that Springs are the lifeline of millions of people in the hills and mountains of the Himalayan region. Though the Himalayas are the source of numerous perennial rivers, communities in this region largely depend on springs to meet their drinking, domestic and agricultural water needs, and to sustain the base flow of the rivers. Drying of springs is an emerging issue in the region as a result of which communities are facing unprecedented water stress. Drying up of spring sources has adversely affected rural water security.

Himachal Pradesh is predominantly an agrarian state with about 2/3rd of its population depending on agriculture for their livelihoods. As part of the Himalayan mountain ecosystem, the State is home to a wide range of natural water resources. 60% of the villages depend on rain and springs as main source of water for household and irrigation purposes. As per Ministry of Jal Shakti, Govt of India (2024) there are 8890 mapped springs in 12 district of the State. A sample survey of springs has revealed that over 50% of the springs have either dried or water discharge from them has significantly reduced (<50%) (Department of Environment Science and Technology, 2017).

Key components for Protection and conservation of Natural Water Sources springs are:-

- I. Prioritize critical springs based on their vulnerability to carry out rejuvenation though a landscape approach.
- II. Develop a detailed climate resilient spring shed development plan for the vulnerable springs.
- III. Develop village water security plan in the identified spring-sheds

Therefore, it was proposed that during the FY 2025-2026, 50 spring in 20 DMUs will be identified on pilot basis to carried out the following activities under the Spring shed Management.

- 1. Spring Inventory, Data Monitoring and Hydro geological Assessment.
- 2. Preparation of Rejuvenation plan with VFDS.
- 3. VIDS Mobilization & Capacity Building.
- 4. Implementation of plan.
- 5. Monitoring of plan and feedback.

Further Governing Body was apprised that for this purpose Rs. 10 Lakh shall be spent on each spring shed and total expenditure will be about 5 cr. The activity shall be carried out on pilot basis and depending upon its success, it will be extended in other spring shed under the Project area in the coming years. Services and expertise will have to be taken by the JICA Forestry Project to train and educate the staff and communities in this subject in the initial year of implementation.

Since funds are available under the component II (Sustainable Biodiversity Management) and the activities proposed in the selected sites are proposed to be taken up under Satoyama based Biodiversity Conservation.

The Agenda Item was placed before Governing Body for its approval.


AGENDA ITEM No.-13:-

Outcome of Mid Term Review

Governing Body was apprised that, during the review, Draft Proposal suggesting changes in the Project was submitted by IIP JICA Forestry Project to the JICA India team given below:-

- 1. Increase the Project period from FY 2027-28 to FY 2030-31.
- 2. Enhance the working area by 140 VFDS, BMCsc and 280 SIIGs in the existing Project ranges without engaging additional staff.
- 3. The company created under the project will not be supported by the Project. This is in line with JICA India's experience elsewhere in the country.
- 4. The Project should endeavor with clusters and Federation based approach and align the livelihood activities of SHGs with HPRLM.
- 5. Great impetus should be given to create market linkages beyond IIPRLM wherever possible.
- 6. All existing SIIGs may adopt additional Income Generation Activities for their sustainable livelihood.
- 7. To extend SATOYAMA beyond Protected areas in the entire Project area.
- 8. As per DPR vehicles have been provided to Ranges for 36 months. This period may be enhanced till end of the Project with additional budget requirement of Rs 30 Cr to be carved out from contingencies fund (100% reimbursable).

AGENDA ITEM No.-14:-

Providing of funds for upcoming Durgesharanya-Kangra Zoological Park at Bankhandi from JICA Forestry Project:

Governing Body was apprised that Hon'ble Chief Minister of HP desired some funding support from JICA for Durgesharanya-Kangra Zoological Park at Bankhandi.

Further Governing Body was apprised that, during the recent Project Mid Term Review, JICA raised its concern of marginal utilization of the State Share to 6% instead of the agreed 20% and emphasized to increase the State Share to 20% to avoid the loan disbursement issues at later stage. Further, it was suggested to find out modalities to increase the State Share immediately to avoid any disbursement issues of reimbursement claims in future.

As on FY-2024-25, Project has incurred the total expenditure of Rs. 301.01 Cr. upto March'2025 which includes Rs. 284.28 Cr. of JICA cligible loan portion and remaining Rs. 16.73 Cr. counterpart funding of State. As per the concern raised by the JICA Review Mission, the trend of the expenditure is 94:06 instead of agreed 80:20. The ratio of the expenditure incurred should be Rs. 241Cr. (80%) reimbursable portion and Rs. 60 Cr. (20%) under state share.

As such, it was proposed to book amount of Rs. 37 Crore for Durgesharanya-Kangra Zoological Park at Bankhandi under State Head to cover-up the gap and smooth disbursement of reimbursement claims. However, best efforts will be made to reimburse some amount from JICA otherwise entire amount will be booked under State Share.

The Agenda was placed before Governing Body for approval.

Decision:-

Governing Body approved the Agenda; however it was decided to send a separate proposal to Finance Department on single file for allocation of Budget andfurther, directed to make the best efforts to reimburse some amount from JICA India.

<u>Project on Protection of assets created by HPFD under JICA Forestry Project in Kullu Division along River Beas</u>

Governing was apprised that, during a recent visit of JICA India regarding Midterm Review of HP JICA Forestry Project with effect from 05-09th May 2025, a meeting was held between Shri Sundar Singh Thakur Hon'ble MLA Kullu and ShriVineet Sarin Chief of Development Operations JICA India. In the meeting Hon'ble MLA raised the issue of over flooding of Beas river due to heavy rains and cloud burst in Kullu Valley and the losses caused to assets. He requested JICA India Team to fund a small Project for Kullu town by putting a protection wall along the river side mainly with objective to protect Kullu town and downstream area from flooding of Beas river.

A project proposal amounting to Rs. 9.28 Crore has been received from DMU Kullu with a estimated cost of Rs 9.28 Crore and placed before Governing Body as Annexure-F.

Further Governing Body was apprised that, the Chief of Development Operations JICA India during the meeting suggested that the proposal be first got approved from the Governing Body and thereafter be submitted to JICA India for consideration, because some of the activities suggested, do not fall within the components of JICA Forestry Project.

The funds for the Project will be carving out from Component IV- Institutional Capacity Strengthening and will be released only after seeking final approval from JICA India.

The Agenda was placed before Governing Body for concurrence.

Decision:-

The Agenda was concurred by the Governing Body and decided to send the proposal to JICA India through MoEF&CC.
